

Multi-Agency collaboration is key

The fight against counterfeit and substandard medicines requires smart multi-agency partnerships to win.

The Ministry of Health, FBO facilities, health workers and the National Medicines Regulatory Authority should work collaboratively in combating circulation of counterfeits/substandard medicines.

As a health worker, you should play a **watchdog** role by always being keenly vigilant in your facility. Ensure you report any suspected medicine to your local Minilab partner.

Why are counterfeit medicines harmful?

They may:

-  Be toxic and cause harm to the patient
-  Cause Antimicrobial Resistance
-  Cause death
-  Prolong illness thereby reducing economic productivity



-  Erode patients' confidence in the Health Systems
-  Be costly to the patient and the healthcare system in the long run
-  Lead to waste of resources

How can I identify counterfeit/substandard Medicines?

The medicine is suspect if:

- ⇒ The label on the carton does not match label on the container
- ⇒ The trade name is misspelled, or the symbol ® or TM is absent or does not follow trade name
- ⇒ The manufacturer's name or logo is illegible or incorrect and hologram does not look authentic
- ⇒ The manufacturer's address is missing or incomplete
- ⇒ The amount of active ingredient per unit dose is not clearly labeled
- ⇒ The manufacture/expiry date is not indicated on the label
- ⇒ The tablets/capsules appear discoloured, mouldy and crumble
- ⇒ The packaging varies in quality and the text differs in font and color from the genuine medicine
- ⇒ The tablets/capsules have breaks, cracks, embedded surface spots, contamination, splits or pinholes

What can I do to stop counterfeit medicines

You should:

1. Implement EPN Guidelines on Good Pharmacy Practice
2. Select and procure medicines from authorized suppliers only
3. Develop and implement a CHECKLIST for receiving all in coming supplies



4. Conduct regular VISUAL INSPECTION of medicines at the store and all end user units
5. If, after conducting a VISUAL INSPECTION, you suspect the medicine to be counterfeit, inform your local MINILAB PARTNER immediately using the **contact address** provided overleaf to get further instructions on how to send a sample for quality testing and further action steps
